Call for Authors (April 1st, 2023)

(Especially for those who are interested in the topic and wondering what to study next)

Over the past years, I have been attempting to understand the actual accounts of deacons' roles and responsibilities within the early church documents. Previously, there has been no source-based material available. Arguments have relied on traditions dating back to the 16th century, even though the source material has changed significantly through critical editions.

At present, there is one available publication addressing deaconesses: **Ordained Women in the Early Church**, published in 2005 by *Madigan* and *Osiek*. The first extensive attempt to read sources about deacons in a fresh way was *Grossi*, *Koet*, and *Geest*, eds., **Diakonia**, **Diaconiae**, **Diaconato**: **Semantica e storia nei Padri della Chiesa**, XXXVIII Incontro di studiosi dell' antichità cristiana. SEA 117 (Roma: Augustinianum, 2010). Now there is also a collection of articles exclusively in English, **Deacons and Diakonia in Early Christianity** (2018) by *Koet*, *Murphy*, and *Ryökäs*, which covers a broader range of material (https://www.mohrsiebeck.com/en/book/deacons-and-diakonia-in-early-christianity-9783161566462). A sequel to the latter book, addressing the third and fourth centuries, will be published in 2023 by Mohr Siebeck.

Based on the findings, deacons/deaconesses have served as servant-leaders or in leadership positions in congregations. They have supported bishops, particularly in worship and sacrament administration. They have been responsible for conveying messages within the congregation to and from the bishop, as well as between congregations. They have provided assistance to those in need and have personally helped when possible.

However, the overall picture still needs to be completed. Tens of documents from the first three centuries with information about deacons await analysis, while there are hundreds of such documents from later centuries.

If you have the opportunity to delve into early church documents in their original language within a few years, this might be an offer for you. In five steps, I'll describe what you can do. If you already know some early church language, proceed to step B.

- A. Train yourself in your chosen language (e.g., Syriac, Aramaic, Ge'ez, Greek, Latin).
- B. Read the example studies mentioned below. Observe their methods and presentation styles.
- C. Reserve a research subject from me, such as an available author or published document. You may also form a group of researchers. An up-to-date list of some available documents is below (LINK).
- D. Prepare a well-written English analysis that withstands international expert referee review, explicitly discussing deacons' responsibilities, roles, functions, and division of labour in the document.
- E. Send your completed article to me at ryokas@uef.fi.

There are two possibilities for the pace of progress. If you are a Patristic scholar, it might be possible to include your presentation in the session on the theme at the Oxford Patristics Conference in August 2024 (see https://www.oxfordpatristics.com). The article may be published later in their Studia Patristica. Act quickly if you consider this a possibility. If this timeline is too fast, there is a slower alternative:

I will attempt to compile the later articles into one (or two) special Diakonian Research Journal (Open Access) issues during the years 2025–2027. The journal publishes a separate online issue once a year, collecting referee-approved articles related to a specific theme. I will serve as the guest editor for this issue. Special issues are not published unless there is sufficient material so publication may be delayed by a few years. The procedure will be agreed upon with each approved article author individually.

I have agreed on this procedure with the Journal's editorial board, and it remains valid unless there are changes in the prerequisites (e.g., funding). If numerous articles are submitted, we may consider publishing them as a book.
